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A Short Portrait of UDPS:

Uttara Development Program Society is an Institution for Social and Financial Services. It as a national NGO, has been working in implementing different humanitarian social development projects and microcredit programs in 21 Districts with 92 branch offices including project office across the country for the last 35 years for socio-economic development of the rural and urban poor specially women and children having its head office in Dhaka encompassing 461,185 (Microcredit-297,625 + Project-163,560) beneficiaries during the year. It has also been providing financial assistance from microcredit programs to bring the poor people out of extreme poverty and change their lifestyle making them self-reliant. UDPS was established by Mr. AFM Akhter Uddin, founder and Chief Executive of UDPS in Salandar under Sadar Upazila of Thakurgaon district on September 1, 1986. A total of 610 (Microfinance 535 + Project 75) skilled and dedicated employees are employed with UDPS to implement Microcredit programs and all kinds of projects including imparting training, formal and nonformal education, humanitarian socio-economic development project, awareness building on social issues, community mobilization, disaster management, women and child development, raising awareness for adaptation of climate change, food security and livelihood.

Vision:

The vision of UDPS is to build Bangladesh through socio-economic development and sustainable cultural status, environment friendly, based on justice, free from exploitation and discrimination.

Mission:

Socio-economic development of rural and urban poor of men and women, adolescent, children, disabled, unemployed youth and disaster affected mass people through an extensive and intensive participatory development process.

Key Objectives of UDPS:

1. The objectives of the institution is to emancipate the groups or community people from exploitation through raising their self-respect and self-confidence. To make self-reliant of the poor and destitute people especially the lagging behind women children, adolescent's aborigine people and tribal society through socio-economic development.

2. Motivating the rural and urban people strengthen their socio-economic status forming groups, inspire regular savings, attend regular weekly meeting and provide credit for undertaking economic activities with a view to make them self-reliant.

4. To provide support services and cooperation to people, make them aware and conscious relating to program activities, education, health, nutrition, family planning, child care, agricultural works and women development of the society.

5. To extend cooperation and work with Government, donors, INGOs, and other organizations on various socio-economic development works, natural/social disasters, rescue operation, relief and rehabilitation activities, welfare of disabled, crippled handicapped.

6. Inspiring the women and men to bring gender equity in the society through providing training and implementing educational programs and organizing meeting and seminars. Creating mass awareness to combat against the women and child repression and trafficking.

7. Providing training to men and women to raising their capacity and skills to enhance their income, extend cooperation to their income generating activities, management of program, keeping accounting as well as to help them for self-reliant.

8. To provide health care services to community people through training, awareness building and implementation of different projects in collaboration with Government and other organizations.

9. To provide education to the children involving them in the mainstream efforts of the Government educational institutes with a view to provide national curriculum based education and capacity building of the mass people.

Working Areas in Map



Overview of Microcredit Programs

With a view to alleviating poverty through improvement of standard of living of poverty stricken people across the country and women's empowerment, UDPS started implementation of microfinance program with an own fund of Tk.50,000 in 1987. It realized that the availability of financial services for the poor households reduces vulnerability and helps poor people increase their income; so families are able to improve their well-being along with access to better nutrition, health care and education. On 30 June, 1993 UDPS became partner of PKSF and continued the following diversified microcredit programs and activities with the financial assistance and generous cooperation of PKSF along with UDPS own fund.

Special Features of Savings

UDPS microfinance program gives top priority for saving and offers its saving products in such a manner that Group members feel encouragement in money saving despite their low income.

Uniqueness of UDPS Savings

- Savings are fully protected
- Deposits can be withdrawn at any time
- Interest rates are competitive
- Small deposits are also accepted
- Savings service is provided at the client's locality
- Transparent accounting
- Strong MIS

Classification of Savings:

Considering the importance of saving money for future use and investment, UDPS has been maintaining 3 saving accounts for the welfare of its members.

(1) **General savings**: Every member after enrollment in group must deposit a particular amount of money weekly in their group fund until the expiry of their membership. Generally group member deposit savings at least BDT 1.00 weekly against their per loan of BDT 1000/-.Members are generally not allowed to withdraw savings until full recovery of their loan amount. UDPS pays 6 percent profit on annual basis to the members against their savings. Each member has to maintain all his/her transactions in a passbook given by UDPS with a fee of TK 10/- only. Up to 30 June 2021

, a total of BDT 3348.06 million collected including savings interest, BDT 2992.55 million returned/withdrawn and outstanding balance stands at BDT 355.57 million as general savings.

(2) **Voluntary Savings**: Under this scheme, a member can deposit any amount of savings in his/her account. Members can withdraw their savings at any time to meet up their needs.



UDPS pays 6 percent profit on annual basis to the members against their savings. Up to 30 June 2021, a total of BDT 566.29 million collected including savings interest, BDT 504.62 million returned/withdrawn and outstanding stands at BDT 61.67 million as voluntary savings.

(3) **UDPS Monthly Savings Project (UMSP):** Considering the future economic solvency of the group members and their family members, UDPS introduced a long term savings scheme which is known as UMSP. A member can open and maintain only one account. The duration of UMSP is for 5 years and 10 years. Profit is paid @ 7% for 5 year and 12% for 10 years duration. The monthly installment of savings in each account is TK 100/-, TK 200/-, TK 300/-, TK 400/- TK 500/-, TK 1000/-, TK 1,500 and TK 2,000 /- and UMSP account holder must deposit their installment by 10th of each month. Up to 30 June 2021, a total of BDT 142.93 million collected, BDT 93.82 million returned/withdrawn and outstanding stands at BDT 49.11 million as voluntary savings.

On the whole, UDPS collected a total savings of BDT 4057.17 million including savings interest, savings withdrawn BDT 3590.94 million and outstanding balance of total savings stands at BDT 466.22 million up to 30 June, 2021.



Overall Trend of Credit Program in 2020-2021

Microcredit operation is considered as one of the major important program of UDPS to provide its target group members various economic development activities for creating their employment and income generation as per its strategy. The demand of credit increases of the target group members as their loan utilization capacity rises. Credit is provided to the members and clients based on various components.

Components of Credit Programs:

- 1) Jagoron (Rural and Urban Micro-credit Program),
- 2) Buniad (Ultra-poor Program),
- 3) Agrosor (Microenterprise Program),
- 4) Sufalon (Seasonal and Agriculture Loan),
- 5) In implementing the project 'ENRICH or SAMRIDDHI' of PKSF, UDPS has distributed three types of loans: (a) Income generation loan, (b) Lifestyle development loan and (c) Assets creation loan to the beneficiaries as per objectives of the project.
- 6) Livelihood Restoration Loan (LRL)

1) Jagoron:

Previously known as Rural Microcredit and Urban Microcredit Program (RMC), Jagoron is an appropriate financial assistance program to promote household-based enterprise development in rural and urban areas of the country. This component is for the moderate poor, manual laborers of rural and sub-rural areas and small and medium businessmen for utilizing their working ability, development of skills and use of local resources. The individual loan ceiling per member is up to BDT 49,000/-. Borrowers can invest this loan in any income generating

activities for their wellbeing.

Microcredit operation under Jagoron in 2020-21

- This credit programs has been operating in 92 branch offices of UDPS.
- Cumulative loan disbursement to borrowers is BDT 13872.14 million up to 30 June, 2021
- Average loan size under this program stood at BDT 36,380.00 only



Outstanding amount of loan reached at BDT 939.8 million.

Borrowers under this program are 38,492 during FY 2020-21 which is 85.87 percent of the total borrowers.



2) Buniad (Ultra-poor Program):

The ultra-poor have always been excluded from the microcredit services because of the perceived belief that they are vulnerable to loan repayment. The average loan size per borrower under this component is BDT 20000.00 only. The objectives of the project are to increase the social dignity through organizing and providing loan to the rural and urban poor people living below the poverty line, leading life with dearth of nutrition, illiterate and lack of awareness but have



capability. Under Buniad, some flexibility in deposits, withdrawal of savings, loan repayment, attendance in group meetings and minimum savings requirement for fresh loan is allowed in the loan policies for larger inclusion of ultra-poor in the society

Microcredit operation under Buniad in 2020-21

- This credit programs has been operating in 40 branch offices of UDPS.
- Cumulative loan disbursement to borrowers is BDT 807.31 million up to 30 June, 2021
- Average loan size under this program stood at BDT 12685.00only.
- Outstanding amount of loan reached at BDT 2.80 million.
- Borrowers under this program are 315 during FY 2020-21 which is 0.70 per cent of the total borrowers.

3) Agrosor (Micro Enterprise Program):

The main objectives of the programs are to extend its financial services to the progressive members of other programs for undertaking economic activities that require larger amount of capital for expediting employment generation, aims at accelerating their efforts and initiatives, creating new employment opportunities side by side increasing income through implementing the programs. Individual loan ceiling per borrower under this component is



BDT 81,000- 15,00,000. The aim of the program is to create small entrepreneurs who will create wage based employment along with self- employment.

Under the programs microenterprise loan covers small business, production of market valued crops, rearing poultry and livestock, fish culture, food processing, cottage industry, boutique and batik, pottery, transport, health care, manufacturing medicine, establishing pathological clinic, beauty parlor, house building and repairing etc. UDPS has been implementing the "Microenterprise Program (ME)" through its 92 branch offices in 21 districts across the country

Microcredit operation under Agrosor in 2020-21

- Cumulative loan disbursement to borrowers is BDT 7172.64 million up to 30 June, 2021
- Average loan size under this program stood at BDT 126,473/-.
- Outstanding amount of loan reached at BDT 830.45 million.
- Borrowers under this program are 4574 during FY 2020-21 which is 10.20% of the total borrowers.

4) Sufolon (Seasonal & Agriculture Loan)

This financial services has created tremendous impetus for the investment in different income generation activities including cultivation crop and processing, livestock, fishery, agro forestry and agro processing. The salient features of Sufolon are provision for flexible repayment such as one shot. seasonal or balloon repayment, consistent with the seasonal agricultural activities and the flexibility of having multiple loans to diversify their



production. UDPS provides seasonal agricultural loan to its borrowers at the beginning of a particular season so that they can utilize agricultural inputs properly and can avail materials to increase their production through skill training, technologies and markets.

Microcredit operation under Sufolon in 2020-21

- This credit programs has been operating in 19 branch offices of UDPS.
- Cumulative loan disbursement to borrowers is Tk 159.67 million up to 30 June, 2021
- Average loan size under this program stood at BDT 39097.00 only.
- Outstanding amount of loan reached at BDT 2.93 million.
- Borrowers under this program are 133 during FY2020-21 which is 0.3% of the total borrowers.



5) Loan disbursement under ENRICH (Samriddhi) Project in three categories:

In implementing the project 'Enhancing Resources and Increasing Capacities of Poor Households towards Elimination of their Poverty-ENRICH or 'Samriddhi' of PKSF' UDPS has distributed the following 3 types of Microcredit Loans to the beneficiaries as per objectives of the project up to 30 June 2021:



- Income generation Activities (IGA) loan: Under this component, a total of BDT 12.66 million has been disbursed among 299 borrowers during the reporting year with a cumulative disbursement of BDT 82.25 and the loan outstanding balance stood at BDT 9.86 million.
- Livelihood development: The outstanding balance of this category of loan stands BDT 10,386.00 only.
- Assets creation loan: A cumulative amount of BDT 5.42 million has been disbursed to borrowers and the outstanding balance of loan stands at BDT 0.21 million.

6) Livelihood Restoration Loan (LRL):

This type of loan is provided to the marginal and small farmers, mini and cottage entrepreneurs, trained and unemployed youths, returnee, migrant workers and participants of ENRICH, Jagoron, Agrosor, Buniad and Sufolon programs. LRL also provdes financial services to ethnic minorities, people with disabilities and other disadvantaged groups.


PKSF give this loan to its partner organizations at the rate of 5% service charge and the partner organizations disburse to its borrowers at the rate of 18%. LRL borrowers can repay weekly, monthly and even the entire amount within the maximum limit of two years.

Up to June, 2021 UDPS disbursed an amount of BDT 31.97 million to 1015 beneficiaries and the outstanding balance is TK 25.64 million which is 1.84% of the total outstanding.

Increase of Members, Savings, loan disbursement and loan outstanding from 2016-2021



The following major components of ENRICH programs are described briefly

a) Health: This component establishes linkages with hospitals, clinics, organizations and individuals who provide health care services to the disadvantaged people of the rural community. There are 3 health assistants and 21 health attendants who supervise the field work and conduct static clinic. A total of 20,925 household have been given health cards up to June, 2021. A total of 36,825 and 12,811 patients have been treated through organizing 4,333 static clinics and 776 satellite clinics respectively. 21 health camps have been conducted in which 4,206 patients have been given treatment. A total of six eye camp was organized where 245 patients have been given proper treatment and 152 eye cataract operations have been done successfully. Besides, up to June, 2021 a total of 113,300 Anthelmintic, 158,047 Iron tablets, 43,529 Pustikona and 97,259 Calcium tablets have been distributed to the beneficiaries. During the reporting year, 269 pregnant women received health services and 247 pregnant women received pre delivery services.

- b) Education: There are 40 teachers, who operate 40 education centers covering 30 villages where 1177 students are enrolled up to June, 2021. Due to Corona pandemic situation, all programs related to education were closed as per Government decision.
- c) Special credit services: Three types of special credit services have been designed for the Enrich households: Income Generating Activities Loan (IGAL), Livelihood Improvement Loan (LIL), and Asset Creation Loan (ACL).

The loan ceiling of these credit services varies from BDT 10,000 to 1 million and service charges vary from 8% to 25% on declining balance method. A total of BDT 12.66 million has been disbursed to 299 borrowers during the reporting period and the loan outstanding stands BDT 10.08 million up to June, 2021 under the above three categories.

- d) Enrich Centre: These centers are known as community hub, each center is managed by an 11-member ward committee, headed by the elected member of the Union Paris had. Up to June, 2021 a total of 9 enrich centers have been set up where ward coordination committee meeting and union coordination committee meeting were supposed to organize but due to Corona pandemic situation, no meeting were held and committee were formed.
- e) Beggar Rehabilitation program: It is a unique initiative of ENRICH. So far 8 beggars have been rehabilitated and they are now living with dignity.



f) Community level Action: Under this component, ENRICH promotes repairing or building culverts, bridges, and sanitary latrines and shallow tube-wells in public places such as school, colleges, mosques, temples and libraries.

Other Activities:

a) Project Review and Project Formulation Workshop:

A whole day workshop on review and next project formulation of value chain development projects was held on 29 December, 2020 at the training center of PPD with Mr. AFM Akhter Uddin, Founder and Chief Executive of UDPS in the chair. The project in-charges of both dairy value chain and Medicinal plant projects presented their progress, lessons learnt, challenges and future strategies and expansion areas for next project. All the participants took part in the discussion and came up with some specific areas/program to be proposed for the next project.

b) Visit to Herbal village of Laxmipur, Kholabaria by Divisional Commisioner, Rajshahi: At the invitation of UDPS, Mr. Nur-ur Rahman, Divisional Commisioner, Rajshahi visited the Laxmipur Kholabaria village which is known as Herbal Village on 08 July, 2019. He spoke in a discussion meeting organized by UDPS and stressed the importance of herbal plants in the treatment of different human diseases. Among others, Mr. Shah Reaz, Deputy Commissioner, Natore and other high officials of Natore were present in the meeting. Later he visited herbal nursery supported by UDPS at the village.

c) Visit to Medicinal Plant Project area by Unani and Ayurvedic company representatives.

A team of 10 representatives of 7 Unani and Ayurvedic companies headed by Mr. Ahsan Habib, Assistant Director, Bangladesh Drug Administration Regional Office, Bogura. Mr. Selim, Business Development Officer informed them about the production, processing and marketing aspects of medicinal plants grown by the farmers.





6. UDPS Dairy Value Chain Project

This project is financially supported by PKSF through its PACE (Promoting Agricultural Commercialization and Enterprises) value chain development component.

Title of the project:

To increase the income and create employment opportunity of the entrepreneurs through production and marketing of milk products.

Duration of the project: 28 months (March, 2018 to June, 2020.).

Total Budget: BDT 80, 15,000/- (PKSF Grant -BDT 71,86,000/-, UDPS contribution BDT 829,000/- only). An additional budget of BDT

Location of the project: Shahjadpur upazilla of Sirazgonj district.

Number of beneficiaries of the project: 2010 (Cow rearer-1860, Curd/Dahi producer - 100, Chana producers- 10, Ghee producer-10, Butter producer-10, Cheese producer-10, Paravet-10

Goals:

To develop dairy entrepreneurs for production and marketing of high value added milk products.

Objectives:

- To increase the productivity of cows and reduce the calf mortality rate in the project area through improved livestock husbandry practices;
- To provide practical skills and technical support to the concerned entrepreneurs for quality production of milk products like Ghee, Cheese, butter. curd etc.
- . To support the entrepreneurs for processing, storage and marketing of various milk products.
- Build a linkage with input suppliers, service providing companies/institutions for accessibility of quality inputs and service in the project area.

Activities so far done during the project:

- a) Imparting training to 1,860 livestock farmers on improved cow rearing practices.
- b) Increase the knowledge and skills of 10 paravets/service providers through practical training.

- c) A total of 140 entrepreneurs trained on production, packaging, storage and transport of various milk products like Cheese, ghee, curd, butter, etc. In addition to this, about 250 new entrepreneurs were developed for production of such high value added milk products;
- d) Organized 15 vaccination campaigns to vaccinate all the animals of the project beneficiaries against Anthrax, Foot and Mouth Disease (FMD), Hemorrhagic septicemia etc.
- e) Provided financial support in procurement of utensils/equipment required for production of milk products
- f) Arranged field visit to project locations by the representative of different institutions.
- g) Developed a video documentary film on the activities.
- h) Signing MOU/Agreement with service providers/ institutional buyers.
- i) Arrange issue based meeting, workshop, seminars and field days.
- j) Report preparation, compilation and submission.



3) Uttara Agriculture Institute, Bogura:

UDPS has established the "Uttara Agriculture Institute, Bogura" at Ranirhat, PS. Shajahanpur, Bogura on 1.72 acres of land with a view to contribute diploma degree holders on agriculture and fishery sector with its own fund. Presently, the Institute has been conducting four years Diploma Course in Agriculture. Modern technologies for boosting agriculture production are included in the course curriculum. The Institute has a large vacant land in the campus for using as demonstration field and practical activities in agriculture. Up to June, 2020, a total of seventy one students have successfully passed the final examination and obtained Diploma in Agriculture. There are five teachers and four staffs (Accounts officer 1+ support staff 3). The Institute has already got approval from Bangladesh Technical Education Board (BTEB) for four years Diploma Course in Fish Culture and planned to start admission soon. The management of the Institute has a future plan to upgrade the Institute into Agriculture College for offering degree courses.

Due to Corona situation in the country, the academic activities of this school was also closed as per decision of the Government.

4) Abdar Rashid Nurul Huda Technical Education Center

UDPS has established Abdar Rashid Nurul Huda Technical Education Centre at Rupshi, Enayetpur under Sirazgonj district. This technical education center has got approval from Bangladesh Technical Education Board, Dhaka. This Centre has been conducting four trades namely Electrical House Wiring, Plumbing and Pipe fittings, Dress making and tailoring and Mobile Phone servicing on three/six months duration. A total of twenty six students have completed their courses and obtained certificates on different trades.

hard work with good team sprit over the year. The departmental activities are divided into three wings namely a) Human Resources, b) Administration and c) Estate and legal support

Human Resources (HR)

Recruitment and Selection: HR wing was provided technical and logistic supports for recruitment of qualified staffs to the different departments/projects in head office and field level of UDPS during the fiscal year 2020-21. During the reporting year, a total of 119 staff have been recruited in different positions. In the same time, a total of 161 staff has been dropped out from job due to completion of project and appointment contract, resignation, termination etc. Besides; a total of 11 senior level staff has received training on various topics from MRA and PKSF.

Administration Wing:

The administration wing is well equipped with qualified and experienced multidisciplinary team for smooth functioning of their role and responsibilities. The purpose of the wing is to provide better support services in diverse areas of administration of the organization for reaching at its desired goal. The wing has completed various planned administrative and logistic support services and notable achievement were made in Office security, Co-ordination meeting, EC/AGM meeting, Development of policy, Issues office orders, Provides logistic support services, Annual Report, maintenance and cleanliness at work place, Payment of all kinds of monthly utility bills for head office, Undertake annual inventory, Vehicle purchase, repairing and maintenance, Purchase of motorcycles for management staff, Handle disciplinary action cases, Preparation of deeds and agreements of house rent and other support.

Estate and Legal Support:

This wing is responsible for looking after the land, buildings, fixed assets and legal cases (both for staff and borrowers) of the organization. In every district, a panel of lawyers is engaged by UDPS for filing cases, hearing and settles the dispute in various courts. The representative staff from this wing maintain liaison and provide logistic support in settlement of cases.



Management of Accounts and Audits:

UDPS has been maintaining and managing fully computerized accounting system with skilled and experienced Accounts Officers strictly following the International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRS) as adopted by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of Bangladesh (ICAB) for accountability and transparency of financial resources. UDPS conducts yearly both Internal Audit and External Audits as it believes in transparency and accountability. External audit is carried out once a year hiring a well reputed 'Chartered Accountants & Firms' approved and enlisted with PKSF and MRA. Besides, PKSF also conducts external audit of UDPS accounts by a 'Chartered Accountants & Firms' hired by them at the end of every financial year.

Research and Publications:

UDPS has a Research and Publication Cell responsible for research, printing and publication of books and periodicals on its program activities. It has been carrying out participatory action research on relevant socio-economic and environmental issues and incorporates those research results in advocacy, publish relevant materials which can be used for enhancement of program activities.
